St. Cyprian's Episcopal Church St. Augustine, Florida September 15, 2023 The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all its meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we, too, shall be raised.

The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

The Celebrant then begins with

I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord. Whoever has faith in me shall have life, even though he die.
And everyone who has life, and has committed himself to me in faith, shall not die for ever.

As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives and that at the last he will stand upon the earth. After my awaking, he will raise me up; and in my body I shall see God. I myself shall see, and my eyes behold him who is my friend and not a stranger.

For none of us has life in himself, and none becomes his own master when he dies. For if we have life, we are alive in the Lord, and if we die, we die in the Lord.

So, then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's possession.

Happy from now on are those who die in the Lord! So it is, says the Spirit, for they rest from their labors.

O God of grace and glory, we remember before you this day our brother Frank. We thank you for giving him to us, his family and friends, to know and to love as a companion on our earthly pilgrimage. Give us faith to see in death the gate of eternal life, so that in quiet confidence we may continue our course on earth, until, by your call, we are reunited with those who have gone before; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*







where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.



Francis Hopkinson Smith III

August 19, 1930 - August 24, 2023

Francis Hopkinson Smith III passed away peacefully on Thursday, August 24, 2023 at the age of 93.

He is survived by his partner of 11 years, Anita McDonough; a son, Francis "Hop" Hopkinson Smith; daughter in-law, Meadow Smith; half-sister, Elizabeth Daniel Large; daughter, Dabney Elizabeth Smith; and five grandchildren: Ivey Smith, Emma Grant, Ellie Smith, Holly Smith, Alex Grant, and several caring cousins.

Frank was predeceased by his father, Francis Hopkinson Smith; mother Mary Ware Daniel; wife, Jean Schaeffer Smith; daughter, Cameron Crawford Smith; and half-brother, James Thomas Daniel.

Frank was born in Brooklyn, New York and grew up in Sewanee, Tennessee. He came from a distinguished and historical family. In 1777 his great grandfather, Francis Hopkinson designed the American flag and the seal of the State of New Jersey. He was also a close friend of Benjamin Franklin.

At an early age Frank became interested in the field of architecture. After completing high school at Virginia Episcopal School in Lynchburg Virginia, he attended the University of Oklahoma, the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee and the North Carolina State University College of Design in Raleigh. He then joined the Air Force. He returned to the School of Design and graduated in 1955. He worked with NASA in his early career under Wernher von Braun and other German scientists.

Buckminster Fuller, a famous architect, was his professor, mentor and friend. Later he was fortunate in joining the company FABRAP, where he excelled in planning and design. Increasingly, he became interested in and developed a private nationwide consultant firm. After thirty years, he retired and moved to St. Augustine, Florida.

Frank was a lifelong Episcopalian and devoted member of St. Cyprian's Episcopal Church. He was a dedicated volunteer at the St. Augustine Public Library. He loved playing tennis. At social gatherings, everyone enjoyed his sense of humor. He will be missed by all.

A Memorial Service will be held on Friday, September 15th at 11:00 at St. Cyprian's Episcopal Church (and YouTube Live) where the family will receive friends immediately following the service. He will be laid to rest in Sewanee, Tennessee within his family's plot.
