try 12 years when she lived in Maryland.


Speaking in Tongues for Pentecost

From the Vicar, by Fr. Ted Voorhees Beyond the Commons Update

WOW! What an amazing response to Beyond the Commons! With 41 Pledge Cards returned representing 65 members of the congregation, we are

well over our \$100,000 goal. And, a number of people in the congregation have returned Surveys about Extending Hospitality in the world around us, the combination of benches and chairs for the new sanctuary seating, and added items to our wish list.

The Mission Board is actively discussing renovation plans with contractors and will be moving forward with installing an additional restroom in the Mission House, putting a new roof on the Mission House, and seeking quotes on new signs around our campus. We have delayed the installation of new seating as we explore various options, and the flooring in the sanctuary will wait until the new seating is ready to be installed.

The new kitchen in the Mission House is part of a larger project ... removing walls and flooring, re-wiring and re-plumbing, kitchen layout, and appliance selection. It will also involve rescheduling groups and activities in the Mission House while construction is taking place. Therefore, the Mission Board is moving a little slower to gather all the information they need to proceed.

Although those who have already pledged to the Beyond the Commons campaign have been very generous, our ultimate aim is to have broad participation by the members of the congregation. We are re-inviting those who have not yet pledged to submit a pledge for whatever amount you deem reasonable. In moving forward with our extension of radical hospitality at St. Cyprian's, we want to include everyone ... not because of what is in your wallet or pocketbook ... but because of what is in your soul. And, if you would like to have your voice heard on the Survey, the forms are still available on the chest by the church door.



In the month of **June**, St. Cyprian's collected several hundred items of food for **St. Johns Ecumenical Food Pantry.**

It was a busy shift on **July** 9 for the church's volunteer day. Tommy and Kate delivered 31 bags of groceries from the church.

Melanie greeted and processed the clients' applications, while Joe, Tommy, and Bill filled orders. The back room was staffed by Diane, Kate, and Mary Beth. Together, the team provided 20 needy families with a total of 36 orders of food.

Sheila was married at St. Cyprian's in 1972 and later left when her husband Ronald became a pastor. With his re-


