One of St. Cyprian's outreach ministries is the St. Johns Ecumenical Ministries, known as the Food Pantry. The church is one of 13 religious groups that provide monetary support and food donations and staff the facility at least once a month. In August, the Mission Board voted to donate \$3,000 to the Food Pantry as part of the

"Beyond the Commons" campaign.

According to Mary Lou Woods, St. Cyprian's Pantry Coordinator, combating food insecurity in St. Johns County is an ongoing struggle.

This is due to (1) significant population increases, (2) minimum-wage, part-time service jobs, (3) 50% cut in food stamps, (4) decreased amount of food available from Farm Share and Feeding Northeast Florida, (5) cutbacks by USDA and (6) a decrease in private monetary donations.

Mary Lou says, "There's a delicate balance between monetary and food donations. When money is donated, your

\$1 can purchase five pounds of food. This allows the Pantry to buy what is most needed at the time. However, in July, if we hadn't had so much food donated from St. Cyprian's, client bags would have been sorely lacking."

Food distribution works this way: Every 60 days, a family of 1 or 2 is eligible for one "full bag," and a 3- to 4-person family receives two "full bags."

Each bag contains: 5 cans of vegetables, 3 cans of fruit, 2 cans of soup, a box of pasta and a jar of sauce, a bag of rice, 1 box of cereal, and a snack. In addition, 2 meats are included; the meats are frozen if supplies are on hand, but they are often canned. On any day, the pantry may be out of an item or two.

Once a month, paperwork on each client or family is sent to the federal government to check financial eligibility. ID is required of each client and family member at each visit to the Food Pantry, and everyone who receives food must live in St. Johns County.

The Ecumenical Food Pantry is one important way that St. Cyprian's carries out its mission to "extend radical transforming hospitality to those on the margins of society."

Hurricane Dorian caused unbelievable destruction in the Bahamas and, at this writing, is headed for the coasts of South Carolina and North Carolina. We were fortunate in St. Augustine to only
